SCHOOL ROUTINES

Morning Procedure for students and Parents/Guardians

The morning bell rings at 8:50. Kindergarten and Grade 1 students are to make their way to their designated entrance areas. The rest of the students in the school are to make their way into the school through the doors at the back of the school. Students will be dropped off in the same areas at the end of the day.

At 8:55 a.m. the back doors to the school will be locked for the remainder of the school day. If your child arrives to school after 8:55 a.m., they will need to enter the school through the front doors where they will check in with the office. Students who are in the modulars and arrive late must check in at the office before going to class.

For appointments during the school day, please let the office and your child's teacher know by email. This will help us have your child ready for you when you come to pick them up. Be sure to sign your child out before exiting the building. If your child is returning to school later in the day, they must be signed back into the school. We want to ensure that you and the school are aware of your child's whereabouts.

All students will be dismissed at 3:00 p.m. Please make sure that someone is at the school to pick up your child(ren) on time.

Volunteering at the School

We are looking forward to having parents and visitors at the school this year! ALL VISITORS on the school site must wear identification so that they are identifiable to students, staff and parents as permissible visitors. If you are volunteering or visiting in a classroom, you must first sign-in at the office. You will be given a VISITOR tag to wear. Please return this tag to the office and sign out when you are finished. In any emergency, we must be able to account for the whereabouts of all students, staff and visitors, on site or off-site.

If you are volunteering or going on a fieldtrip, volunteer forms will be available on our school website and district website in the next week.





Student Absence, Late Drop Offs or Pick Ups

Classroom Organization: Split Grades

At times it is necessary to organize the school with classes that combine two grades. Split classrooms are common in schools. It is important to note that students in split classrooms experience similar curriculum learning outcomes as those placed in one grade group. In all classrooms, teachers plan to meet the needs of students and grade level requirements. Like their colleagues, split classroom teachers work to accommodate individual student needs. Our goal is to encourage all students to view themselves as one learning community, crossing the boundaries from one grade to another. Working with others of varying ages in and out of the classroom helps children learn early in life, that people of all ages and skill levels can work with and learn from each other.

Foundation Skills Assessment

Each year, our grade 4 students participate in the Foundation Skills Assessment (FSA).

The Foundation Skills Assessment is an annual provincewide assessment of all B.C. students' academic skills in grades 4 and 7, and provides parents, teachers, schools, school districts and the Ministry of Education with important information on how well students are progressing in the foundation skills of Reading, Writing, and Numeracy. FSAs will be administered to students between October 2- November 10.

The Ministry of Education requires schools to formally provide the school Codes of Conduct. As you probably know, from your child, our Code of Conduct is built on the principles of respect, responsibility and relationships. The children know them as the '3 R's' and are able to articulate quite well what they represent – they begin to learn and discuss them in Kindergarten! These principles guide our actions and our words and provide a 'road map' for us to rely on. Our Code of Conduct supports the continued development of our goal to be socially responsible. It creates the opportunity to discuss where we've gone wrong and is a framework to consider how we can make things 'right'. We would request that you discuss this Code of Conduct with your child and appreciate your participation in supporting these important expectations! Herbert Spencer will promote the values expressed in the BC Human Rights Code respecting the rights of all individuals in accordance with the law, prohibiting discrimination based on race, colour, ancestry, place of origin, religion, marital status, family status, age, physical or mental disability, sex or sexual orientation or gender identity and expression.

Showing Respect is:

Using appropriate language and tone with peers and adults Respecting the environment, property of others, and personal space Listening to and honouring the opinions and feelings of others and their culture Respect for learning, good listening, moving quietly through the halls Using good manners, being polite, "please... may I... thank you"

You are not respectful when:

you use offensive language, talk back, tease or say hurtful things. you push, hit, kick or do hurtful things. you litter, damage property or do harm to the school environment. you interrupt, call out or disrupt the learning environment of yourself and others.

Showing Responsibility is:

Being honest and owning up to your mistakes Coming to school ready to learn, staying on task and doing your best Looking after your belongings including agendas, notices and homework Looking after school property including library books, chromebooks and gym materials Appropriate use of washrooms Being a good role model for others by demonstrating our 3 R's

You are not demonstrating responsibility when:

you are dishonest you disrupt the learning environment of others you damage or misuse school property you forget or lose your materials, homework and assignments

Behaviours which support Relationships:

Active listening Empathy, thoughtfulness and kindness Including others and sharing Patience, Honesty and Cooperation

Students may not:

make hurtful comments or do hurtful things humiliate, intimidate, or exclude others, tease or joke in a hurtful manner engage in physically aggressive behaviour

Consequences:

Responses to, and consequences for, unacceptable conduct will be consistent and just. Wherever possible, disciplinary action will be restorative and include logical consequences. We will take into consideration the circumstances and severity of the misconduct and the students' ability to meet behavioural expectations. The following steps may guide the process: Verbal warning, change or removal from the environment, communication from the teacher, communication from the administration.

District Threat Assessment Protocol: Fair Notice

In the interest of student and staff safety and security, there may be times when schools conduct Threat Assessments.

What Behaviours Initiate a Student Threat Assessment? What is a Threat?

A student threat assessment will be initiated when behaviours include, but are not limited to, serious violence or violence with intent to harm or kill, verbal/written/drawn threats to harm/kill others, Internet, social media, email or text threats to harm/kill others, threatening gestures, possession of weapons (including replicas), bomb threats, and fire setting. All threats must be taken seriously, investigated and responded to.

Duty to Report:

To keep school communities safe and caring, staff, parents, students and community members must report all threat - related behaviours.

What is a Threat Assessment Team?

Each school has a Threat Assessment Team which is multi-disciplinary. The team may include the Principal, Vice-Principal, Counsellor, Resource Teacher and Police Officer. The District Threat Assessment Team may consist of District Staff, the Safe Schools Coordinator and other Ministries/Agencies (e.g., Ministry of Children and Family Development or Fraser Health Authority). District Staff and Community Agencies are trained in the Threat Assessment protocol and process.

Ideally parents/caregivers are involved and engaged in the process and have given consent to share information to support student safety. However, in emergency safety situations, such as Threat Assessments, all parties (the school, School District and the appropriate Community Agencies) have the ability to share information on a need-to-know basis; as supported by case law, and expanded upon by privacy commissioners, without consent or participation of the threat maker and their parents/caregivers.

What is the Purpose of a Student Threat Assessment?

- Ensure the safety of students, staff, parents/caregivers and others.
- Ensure a full understanding of the context of the threat.
- Understand factors contributing to the threat makers' behaviour, including the impact of trauma
- Be proactive in developing an intervention plan that addresses the emotional and physical safety of the threat maker.
- Promote the emotional and physical safety of all.

What Happens in a Student Threat Assessment?

All threat making behaviour by a student shall be reported to the Principal who will activate the protocol for the initial response. Once the team has been activated, interviews may be held with the student(s), the threat maker, parents and staff to determine the level of risk and develop an appropriate response to the incident. Intervention plans will be shared with parents, staff and students as required.

Can I Refuse to Participate in a Threat Assessment Process?

It is important for all parties to engage in the process. However, if for some reason there is reluctance to participate in the process by the threat maker or parent/caregiver, the threat assessment process will continue in order to promote a safe and caring learning environment, with or without the consent of the threat-maker and/or their parents/caregiver.
